Note: Form E 111 is not required in the U.K., or Northern Ireland. It is sufficient to identify yourself as an Irish Citizen.

P.R.S.I Numbers are required on all **Form E 111** in order for them to be accepted abroad when presented for Emergency Treatment.

Children aged up to 15 years generally do not have a P.R.S.I Numbers. In these circumstances the parents **Name** and **Insurance Number** must be provided in **Section A** and the **Children's Names** written in **Section B**.

If you are unable to obtain an **P.R.S.I. Number** for an **Adult/Child** you can ring the **Department of Community and Foreign Affairs** at **(01) 8786444** and ask for **Registration Section**.

E 111 INFORMATION

To obtain emergency medical treatment while you are on holiday or on a temporary visit to another EC Country you need a completed Form E 111. The E 111 is available from your health board and all persons ordinarily resident in Ireland are eligible to obtain the form. It entitles you to urgent medical treatment on the same basis as residents of the country in which you are staying.

Sometimes treatment is free, sometimes you have to pay part of the cost yourself. Alternatively, you may have to pay the full cost and then claim a full or partial refund. Also each of the Community countries has its own rules so you should check with the health board or the Department of Health as to the correct procedures to follow in the country you intend visiting.

It is important to remember that the E 111 may not cover all your medical expenses and that it does not cover the cost of bringing a person back to Ireland in the event of illness or death. For these reasons many people take out holiday insurance in addition to having the E 111.

In the case of visits to the United Kingdom there is no need to bring the E 111. However you may be asked to produce proof of residency in Ireland i.e. passport or drivers licence.
